Adapted from an award-winning play by Claudia Allen, this deeply affecting love story co-stars Sharon Gless (Hannah) of *Cagney and Lacey* fame. Out and proud Hannah and reserved Rachel have shared many decades of love, but now Hannah is prevented from visiting Rachel, who lies in a coma in a nursing home. When a kindly nurse intervenes, Hannah begins to visit her lover secretly and a series of flashbacks reveal their years of enduring partnership, both passionate and tumultuous. *Hannah Free* raises many same-sex relationship rights issues, but at its heart is a powerful story of simple humanity and devoted love.

And as an extra treat, we'll be screening a short selection of classic moments from the iconic 80's police drama *Cagney and Lacey* before the film.

Paul and Eddie have just begun previews for the new Off-Broadway musical "Adam and Steve: Just the Way God Made 'Em." Their lives strangely mirror the characters they are playing. Paul is looking for the perfect man and Eddie is dealing with how his sexuality and faith can mix. After yet another disastrous dating experience, Paul decides he's done with dating and just wants to be a slut like the sexv chorus boys that share his dressing room. In the meantime, Eddie has to tell his parents that he's gay and is starring in a show that calls the bible the "Breeder's Informational Book of Living Examples"... Musical numbers, tap dancing angels, a retelling of Genesis, tele-evangelists... The Big Gay Musical is a smart, funny and thoroughly entertaining film about realising that life gets better once you accept who you really are.



FUERA DE CARTA (Chef's Special) Wed. 18th Nov.

Dir. Nacho G. Velilla / 2008 / Spain / 111min

Maxi thinks his life is perfect. He is a famous cook who owns a top restaurant in Chueca, the gay district of Madrid, with his biggest goal being to get the restaurant rated by the Michelin guide. He is living the gay lifestyle without problems and hangups, with his employees as his closest confidants, Alex and Ramiro. But when his son and daughter (who were born from an unsuccessful marriage) appear and a new neighbor, Horacio (Benjamín Vicuña) moves in (an attractive famous Argentinian ex-soccer player), they completely turn his life upside down and make him question his values....

A briliant non-stop comedy in the style of Pedro Almodovar (and co-starring Almodovar regular Lola Dueñas), *Chef's Special* is one of those rare films where just when you think you can't laugh anymore, things go one step further. An absolute gem, not to be missed!



DROOL Wed. 18th Nov. 9.15pm QFT 2 £5.50

Dir. Nancy Kissam / 2009 / USA / 88 mins

Part *Little Miss Sunshine* road movie, part John Waters camp revenge comedy, *Drool* is a darkly comic tale of accidental murder and unexpected lesbian love.

Anora Fleece has got it rotten. Her husband, Cheb, is a bastard. Her kids treat her bad. And she lives in the middle of nowhere feeling like a nobody. That is until a new neighbour, Imogene Cochran, moves in. Imogene sells Kathy K. Kosmetics, "make-up for the cocoa skinned woman", in a town where racism is standard. But that doesn't stop Imogene and Anora from becoming friends. It also doesn't stop them from becoming more than friends. And when Anora's husband finds them, all hell breaks loose, leading to murder and a very un-nuclear family road trip...

Starring David Lynch favourite, Laura Harring (*Mulholland Drive*), *Drool* is a brilliantly subversive, often hilarious film that asks the question "How far are you willing to go to enjoy the love you deserve?"



J'AI TUE MA MERE (I Killed My Mother) *Thurs. 19th Nov. 6.45pm QFT 1 £5.50* Dir. Xavier Dolan / 2009 / Canada / 100mins

J'ai Tu Ma Mere is the brilliant, semi-autobiographical story of a young gay man coming of age, told through his tortured struggle with his mother.

Written and directed by 20 year old Xavier Dolan, the film tells the story of cool teenager Hubert (played by Dolan), who bickers constantly with mom (Anne Dorval) about everything, from the trivial to the profound. He's also repulsed by her style – to him she's a kitsch monster. Their arguments are alternately hilarious and horrifying, reflecting the pain both are suffering. Their fights escalate until mom hatches a toxic plan: Hubert will be shipped off to boarding school, away from his boyfriend and his life. A standoff between them is the unavoidable climax.

Combining assured writing, a confident directorial style (the scene where Hubert makes love to his boyfriend is a standout) and a beautifully rendered performance, Dolan's arrival on the big screen is an achievement that can't be ignored. **16**



EDIE AND THEA: A VERY LONG ENGAGEMENT Thurs. 19th Nov. 9.15 pm QFT 2 £5.50 Dir. Susan Muska & Greta Olafsdottir / 2009 / USA / 67mins

The makers of The Brandon Teena Story return with an empowering and intimate film centred around a 42-year passionate romance between two women - Edie and Thea. Beginning pre-Stonewall, Edie and Thea's relationship gives us an inspiring glimpse into lesbian life, love, romance, sex, politics and activism since the 1960s. Unable to get married in their home country, Edie and Thea, the latter recently diagnosed with a terminal illness, leave for Canada to legalise their vows with the country's first openly gay judge. As they face the unknown, *Edie and Thea: A Very Long Engagement* has something to enlighten, impress and uplift us all. A truly inspiring documentary not to be missed.

Andrea Gutsche / 23 mins / Canada / 2009 The lesbian answer to Brokeback Mountain, this exquisitely crafted short takes place in a diner in deepest, mid-west America, where the local ladies not only cater for their husbands, but also Loretta - the cowgirl they all look up to. Loretta has eyes for only one though, the quiet waitress in the corner.

THEATRE THE LARAMIE PROJECT



"If god doesn't hate fags, why does he put them in hell?" "This 21 year old little lesbian is ready to walk the line with him"

In October 1998, University of Wyoming student Matthew Shepard was tortured and murdered near Laramie, Wyoming. Aaron McKinney and Russell Henderson were arrested for the crime and, during

the trial, it was alleged that they had targeted Matthew Shepard because he was gay.

In November 1998, New York Theatre Company 'The Tectonic Theater Project' travelled to Laramie and began conducting interviews with the people of the town; these interviews would later be collated and edited to become the basis of a multi award-winning play, *The Laramie Project*.

As part of an international series of readings entitled 'The Laramie Project: 10 Years Later', local Theatre collective 'twentyfivebelfast' present a reading of the original *Laramie Project* play as part of the Outburst festival.






