

Ticket Pricing:

Queer art is about opening doors. We have lots of free events and always keep our ticket prices as low as we can, while ensuring artists and workers are paid fairly.

We know that lack of cash can make it hard to get to events, now more than ever. So, if you're low on funds, for whatever reason, we have a number of £5 access tickets available. And if you really want to go to something but just don't have any money, there are limited free tickets for each event, use promocode queer kitty to access these where available.

All Outburst venues have access for wheelchair users. Braille programme information, audio description, and BSL/ISL translation are available on request for some events. Advance booking for these services is essential. Please contact hello@outburstarts.com to arrange and

We aim to keep our shows as relaxed as possible, so you can use the loo or stretch your body as you need to. If there's a specific seating arrangement that will help you be more comfortable in terms of access, let us know and we'll do our best to help.

We work closely with our partners to ensure that there are all-gender toilets signposted in our festival venues.

Timings, Content Advice & Age Guidance

You'll find approximate event durations on event pages where this information is available to us. Live shows may vary by a few minutes either way, as many of them are brand spanking new and being performed for the first time.

We offer content advice on event pages on our website for shows where we've been advised by artists of violent, sexually explicit, or mental health related content, so you can make an informed decision about attending before booking.

While some events don't have official age guidance ratings, we offer recommendations for most Outburst events. This is based on venue's own regulations, suitability of event content and sometimes just on whether or not the event is likely to hold the attention of a younger audience. All venues serving alcohol are 18+ after 8pm.

ELDERS IN RESIDENCE

Split Britches: Lois Weaver & Peggy Shaw

In celebration of our 16th birthday and the power of queer generations united in creative solidarity, our Artists in Residence this year are Elders in Residence: iconic performance duo Split Britches. We honour the incredible creative legacies and vital ongoing contributions of our queer elders and extend a big Outburst welcome to Lois Weaver and Peggy Shaw.

For over 40 years Split Britches projects have spanned theatre, solo performance, live art, workshops, digital media, models for public conversation, and written work. Founded in New York by Lois, Peggy and Deb Margolin, Split Britches 'is about a community of outsiders, queers, eccentrics – feminist because it encourages the imaginative potential in everyone, and lesbian because it takes the presence of a lesbian on stage as a given.' Lois Weaver is also a professor of Contemporary Performance at Queen Mary University in London. Peggy Shaw is a performer, writer, and teacher. Their work is rooted in the experimental, downtown NY theatre scene and a strong DIY ethos.

Lois and Peggy will be present throughout the festival, sharing their most recent work, *Last Gasp*, on closing night and meeting with artists and activists to make all-generation queer space for conversation. The latter will be through their now legendary "Porch Sittings", relaxed space for the things we wonder about rather than the things we know. Participants are free to muse out loud, observe silently, or reflect upon our collective future. You can come and go as you like. The "porch" is a space to sit, think, dream or get involved in the ongoing conversation.

The Piper's Grip



Eimear Walshe is an artist and writer from Longford. Lesbians Are Touching Mohair Berets

How can fabrics be intertwined with ideologies and ways of thinking?

Alka Nauman's research started from the discovery that the founder of Futurism and active supporter of Italian fascism, Filippo Tommaso Marinetti, had an obsession with touching sensual fabrics. The connection between fascism and lukewarm textiles reminded her of the mohair beret, which in Poland is worn by elderly women who identify with the Catholic far-right.

Mohair beret - fluffy, delicate, lukewarm, funny, soft, sensual, in a way very queer. It is a reminder of home, ambiguity, and of violence.

Lesbians Are Touching Mohair Berets is a short performance by Alka that tries to intercept the mohair beret in an anti-fascist, erotic gesture and use it to talk about her experience of living as a lesbian woman in Poland.

Alka Nauman is a queer interdisciplinary artist who works across dance, visual arts and theatre. She creates performances, installations, videos and dance protests. In her practice she is interested in the use of the absurd, humour, excess and daily grotesques as strategies in the fight against the patriarchal-fascist-heteromatrix. She lives and works between London and Warsaw.

Rioting the wrongs of contemporary Britain, *Ten Commandments* promises to rebalance all the inequities and injustices that surround us.



We're thrilled to welcome one of the most exciting new queer voices in performance to Outburst with her debut show, *LOB*, a tennis and poetry bonanza about moving through sporting spaces as a queer body.

It's the year 2000 and my grandmother, dreaming of Wimbledon glory, is devastated by my lack of prowess.

Having been obsessed with this memory for twenty years, now, with her trusty swingball set, poet and theatremaker Roma Havers once again attempts to serve a LOB. Egged on by locker room banter, a Victorian ghost for a doubles partner and a masked ball that just won't go to plan, at its heart this dance and poetry show prioritises the rearticulation of failure and shame and what it could mean to move as queer bodies in sporting spaces, even if you'll never reach Centre Court.



Josephian Masculinities

Patron Saint of fathers, workers, and a happy death, St. Joseph gets no word of speech in the bible, only his actions are recorded.

Alka Nauman and Eimear Walshe met at Outburst in 2021, and found a crossover of interests in relation to national and religious material culture in Ireland and Poland. They are also both working on projects which relate to dance and nationhood, and research in local histories of sexuality.



T-Kuir

Since the lockdown of 2020, Outburst has been working in partnership with two vital queer arts festivals, FAQ in Buenos Aires and Risco in Saõ Paulo, to deep dive into what queer solidarity and creative exchange can mean across languages and borders. After an incredible online project that saw queer artists, activists, thinkers and visionaries from Northern Ireland, Argentina and Brazil come together for conversations, we produced *Translating Kuir*, a publication about radical queer potential in troubling times.

Taking their inspiration from these conversations, our festivals invited three queer artists to come together for creative residencies to explore how we might communicate about change, mutuality and queer possibility. The result is an ongoing work of ritual intent, where music, words, languages and voices from the past bend notions of time and dance to a new beat, reminding us that revolutionary change is made by all of us, together, now.

Join us for this first sharing of a very special work during the final residency in Belfast.

Dani Nega is an actress, poet and musician of great relevance in the São Paulo scene. Closely linked to the new black Brazilian theatre, she has also produced music that speaks to the experience of black and lesbian women in Brazil.

Analia Couceyro is an award-winning actress, playwright and director in the Argentine film and theatre scene. Her research combines literary material with unconventional spaces.

Donalín Nic Fhearchair is a musician and writer from the Armagh / Monaghan border, best known for her acclaimed folk music project, Dani Larkin.

Queers at Queen's: Podcast with the Seamus Heaney Centre

It's been an incredible few years for our queer poets.

Last year's launch of the ground-breaking *Queering the Green* anthology, edited by Paul Maddern, has put the spotlight on the vibrant LGBTQ+ poetry scene in Ireland and 2022 has seen the publication of new pamphlets by local queer poets Toby Buckley (*Milk Snake*) and Mícheál McCann (*Keeper*). Padraig Regan's first collection, *Some Integrity*, has been shortlisted for the prestigious Forward Prize and Dawn Watson has signed with Granta for her eagerly awaited debut collection, *We Play Here*, which will be published in spring 2023.

We partner with Seamus Heaney Centre at Queen's University Belfast for a conversation with Paul, Toby, Mícheál, Padraig, and Dawn, hosted by the Centre's publishing fellow, Hilary McCollum.

The event will celebrate the launch of the Seamus Heaney Centre's newest podcast series, Queers at Queen's, which features all five poets talking about poetry, life, and Nigella Lawson. The event will double as a live recording of the final episode of the podcast's first season.

Split Britches: Last Gasp

How to survive a loss. First you recalibrate...

In early 2020 Lois Weaver and Peggy Shaw set out to present *Last Gasp*, a live performance questioning demise: of ageing bodies, of civil conversation, of a sustainable planet. The pandemic arrived and knocked the breath out of all of us, as did a period of civil unrest that marched under the banner of 'I can't breathe.' The ironies were not lost as the duo locked down and continued their investigations, resulting in a digital performance, *Last Gasp WFH*.

Two years later, after runs at London's Barbican and New York's La Mama, Last Gasp: A Recalibration gathers us in the same room but not as the same people. Returning to the physical stage, Shaw and Weaver re-evaluate what it means to be together in a theatre and what it means to perform in the aftermath of a foundation shattering crisis. With episodes entitled The Trump in Me, How to Set a Table in an Emergency, and How to Survive a Loss, the legendary performance duo brings us together to recalibrate - not only facing demise but considering strategies for moving on.


Bi Spy

A smart, funny and moving work in development, *FJÜCK* imagines what new planes of queer domesticity can look like when all that's available to you is cheap flatpack furniture. Anton Shebetko

Outburst is excited to present a selection of works from Ukrainian artist Anton Shebetko, in partnership with Catalyst Arts.

An artist and photographer from Kyiv, currently living in Amsterdam, Shebetko works closely with LGBTQ + topics, themes of memory, loss of identity, plurality of history and the role that photography can play in revealing these stories.

His extensive research is devoted to the forgotten queer history of Ukraine, with projects ranging from installations and interventions dedicated to old cruising spots and underground gay resorts in Crimea to more relevant topics such as Ukrainian LGBTQ + soldiers.

This exhibition is part of the UK/Ukraine Season of Culture devised jointly by the British Council and the Ukrainian Institute.





UPHOLD: Outburst Editions

UPHOLD is a not-for-profit online platform that supports and sells the work of artists living or working in Northern Ireland. Created and run by Belfast arts collective Household, Uphold has commissioned two artists to create special limited-edition artworks for this year's festival in response to *Translating Kuir*, an ongoing collaboration between Outburst and international partners FAQ and Risco that explores how we build creative queer solidarity across different languages and "kuir" experiences.

Jennifer Mehigan's work is currently focused on suppressed Irish lesbian historical figures and their graves as horticultural sites, uncovering queer strategies for surviving our crises of kinship and climate. *BETRAY OR BE BETRAYED* (after *Cruise or Be Cruised*) is a series of printed mugs that map her investigation into practices of Irish otherness, worlds of networked desire, abstraction as a method of remaining unknowable, and the body as an animal.

Artist, educator and writer **Emma Wolf-Haugh**'s work is shaped by economic necessity, using forms of recycling, thrift and ephemera. They have created Clothes for queer cruisers - *Trans - Later*, an edition of three embroidered denim jackets sourced in Belfast that nod to the creative processes involved when gender, sexuality, identity and cultural signifiers are woven together on our own terms. Trans - Later marks the body as a site of constant change, where we can re-write ourselves at any time.

These new editions will be available to buy via upholdart.co.uk and you can see them in an exhibition of work by artists featured in Uphold, at 35DP, 35 Donegall Place Belfast.

Chrissy Judy

Dir. Todd Flaherty | 2022 | USA | 96 min

Everyone has that one friend who "can't get their act together", but you can't help but love them to pieces anyway. For thirty-something Chrissy, it's his bestie, Judy, an endearing but perpetually messy ride-or-die. After hustling for years together in the New York City bar scene, Judy is convinced that their two-queen drag act will finally get its big break. That is, until Chrissy's priorities suddenly shift, forcing a disillusioned Judy to closely examine his trajectory as a drag artiste and rediscover his true self in the process.

A surprising and bittersweet comedy, *CHRISSY JUDY* sets us up for the standard snappy gay party story, before knowingly exploring the struggles gay men face in the pursuit of sex, "success", romance, and belonging that will be recognisable to so many of us.

"Spoils, glory, flags and trumpets!...I tell you, I want no more of it. I want for my people security and happiness. I want to cultivate the arts of peace, the arts of life. I want peace and peace I will have!"

We love big screen classics revisited with a modern queer eye and if you haven't seen this one, you're in for a glorious treat! Made in 1933 and screened here in 35mm, *Queen Christina* is one of early cinema's most sophisticated examinations of gender and identity, with screen legend Greta Garbo perfectly cast as the arts loving, peace-seeking, bisexual Swedish monarch who was raised from birth as a boy and continued to present "as a man" throughout her reign. Garbo, who was also bisexual (she had documented dalliances with Tallulah Bankhead, Cecil Beaton, Billie Holiday and Louise Brooks to name but a few) was never more thrilling than in this quintessential screen portrayal that captures her graceful allure and enigmatic persona in one of her finest films.



Patricia Highsmith wrote some of the most exciting thrillers and classics ever to have been adapted for screen: *Strangers on a Train*, *The Talented Mr. Ripley* and of course *Carol*, a partly autobiographic novel and first lesbian story with a happy ending to be published in 1950s America. A reclusive and difficult character in later life, she has frequently been cast as "a mean, cruel, hard, unlovable, unloving human being", a bitter eccentric who preferred the company of her pet snail.

Loving Highsmith offers a fascinating counterpoint to the established Highsmith legend. Using her diaries and notebooks and the intimate reflections of her lovers, friends and family, it offers a deep dive into an enigmatic character who was forced to lead a double life and hide her vibrant love affairs with women but who also partied with Bowie and indulged enthusiastically in the burgeoning queer scene in 1960s France. Excerpts from her diaries voiced by Gwendoline Christie (Game of Thrones, Top of the Lake), beautifully interwoven with archive material of her and her most famous novel adaptations, create a vivid portrait of one of the most fascinating writers of the 20th century.

A glance leads to a smile, a smile to a rendezvous: every love story begins the same way.

In this sensual visual and musical essay by Mohammad Shawky Hassan, Arab folktales, animation, Egyptian pop and the filmmaker's personal love diary form stories that playfully unfold through conversations between Scheherazade, a narrator who never comes into view, and ghosts of former lovers. Heteronormativity is challenged: lovers ask each other about threesomes, Grindr contacts and past dates. Pop clichés are twisted, heartache permeates the men's singing, and poems by Wadih Saadeh are read out while a lover's dirty laundry is aired.

Outburst is proud to have contributed development support to this deeply original queer work that goes beyond conventional film narrative to create a fresh, erotic and beautifully playful portrayal of gay male relationships and connection.

Mohammad Shawky Hassan is an Egyptian filmmaker and video artist living and working in Berlin. His last film *And on a Different Note* was acquired by the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) in New York as part of its permanent collection.

As brilliantly transgressive and hilarious now as it was on its release in 1972, Waters and his merry band of Dreamlanders leave no taboo unsmashed in this gleefully subversive ode to outsiderhood. Legendary drag terrorist Divine is iconic as a wanted criminal hiding out with her family of degenerates in a trailer outside Baltimore while revelling in her tabloid notoriety as the "Filthiest Person Alive." But when a pair of sociopaths (Mink Stole, David Lochary) attempt to challenge her title, Divine resolves to show them and the world the true meaning of the word filthy.



Catflap #2 Launch: Sounds Queer

After a sold out edition #1 of Outburst's new queer writing periodical, *Catflap* is back with a packed second issue full of queer ideas, poetry and essays, edited by poet Mícheál McCann. To celebrate the launch we're excited to welcome three incredible queer sound artists and performers who are making waves in experimental ambient, digital music and political pop. Join us for a very special sonic evening in the beautiful old St. Joseph's Church in Sailortown.

CHIPZEL, aka Niamh Houston, is one of the most iconic performers in the chiptune scene, and master of an unlikely instrument: the Nintendo Gameboy. Chiptune brings together solar punk, video game hardware and nostalgia, making music using affordable devices. The Strabane-born artist has played squats in Milan, the V&A Museum, on a German u-boat and at home here in NI, making beeps, boops, and bangers for over a decade.

CYBELE is a musical, electronic, psychedelic project by Ukrainian artist Anatoly Belov. A multi-discipline artists across video, design, music and performance, he was a member of Lyudska Podoba, the first queer pop band in Ukraine. Since 2018, this project has been dedicated to the Phrygian goddess Cybele, the mother of all gods, whose queer history Anatoly reinterprets by giving Cybele new powers as the protector of all LGBTQ+ people.

BASHAR MURAD is a Palestinian singer/songwriter, producing globally influenced pop music rooted in Palestinian spirit. His music highlights issues facing Palestinian youth, including life under the occupation, gender equality, and LGBTQ+ rights. Dubbed the Palestinian Lady Gaga and "a mild-mannered Arabic provocateur", Bashar's infectious tunes and subversive visuals make him one of the most potent and vital artists in the Arab world.



Workshop: Pitch Shifting

Sound is amazing. The possible combination of sounds is infinite. Yet what we hear every day is usually restricted by expectations of what sounds familiar, conventional or... nice.

So, what happens in a queer playground for your spoken sounds?

Pitch Shifting is a collaboration between improvising vocalist rit. and Peter O'Doherty of Northern Lights Project. Over the next year, they'll be creating an immersive sound installation that will premiere at Outburst Queer Arts Festival in 2023 before touring.

This 90-minute workshop is the first stop along the way - an *exploratorium* where you're encouraged to expand your ears beyond usual expectations. Get curious about the surprising, different and usually discarded sounds and transform them through different ways of listening. Your voices will form the basis of the final soundscape composition.

In these fun, experimental workshops over two festival weekends, we'll swap nice for interesting. As a participant you'll be invited to think creatively, speak, listen, read, write, sit and move (walking or wheelchair). Standing is optional and you can input as much or as little as you fancy.

Participation is FREE but booking a place is essential via Outburst's website.

rit. (they/them) is a vocalist and composer who is also nonbinary and autistic. They use their voice to make sounds, and sometimes their teeth. With a background ranging from traditional folk music, industrial cyberpunk, musical theatre and medical simulation, rit. may even surprise you with a song.


